I firmly believe that these partnerships are the result of the hard work by local governments, private organizations, and individuals over the years of exchanges, and it is these partnerships that play a great role in building bridges that fortify our relationship.

I wish to note that Japan-Florida relations are not limited to any specific area, but range over many areas from trade, tourism, investment, technology, culture, education, arts and sciences, civil society and sport.

Furthermore, I am particularly pleased that these dynamic exchanges of a diversified relationship serve as a driving force that furthers the development of mutual trust and friendship.

I sensed that dynamic when I recently visited with Mr. Bill Johnson, Florida's Secretary of Commerce, who aptly told me that he wished to expand the win-win, or mutually beneficial, nature of the Japan-Florida relationship.
